FOREWORD

The Hive has reimagined what a library should be in the 21st Century, connecting and engaging communities, creating opportunities and promoting a love of learning.

With its mixture of plentiful study resources and innovative social, cultural and heritage facilities, covering 10,000 square metres of space, over five floors, The Hive is more than just a library.

The Hive, and the site on which it stands, is jointly owned by the University of Worcester and Worcestershire County Council. It brings together people from all ages, backgrounds and communities. It is a shared space where use is defined by what visitors want to do, not by who they are. Public library books are shelved alongside university texts; study spaces and computers are shared; and staff are not behind desks but are walking the floors throughout the building, ensuring support and advice is always close to hand.

At its heart is the exceptional children's library, a place where families, schools and parents groups can come together to be inspired and share in the joys of reading. Since opening, The Hive has hosted more than 40,000 visits from schoolchildren and supported more than 4,700 adults with community learning and developing vital job skills. Meanwhile, almost 47,000 people have attended events provided by Worcestershire Archive & Archaeology learning and outreach services.

A PLACE FOR ALL

THE HIVE HAS BECOME A BEACON OF SUCCESS, HELPING TO BUILD RESILIENCE, CONNECTION, INDEPENDENCE AND PROSPERITY IN LOCAL COMMUNITIES AND SEEKS TO INSPIRE PEOPLE OF ALL AGES, FROM ALL BACKGROUNDS TO ASPIRE TO HIGHER EDUCATION.

It is a place where children, students, business people and citizens can come to be inspired, to learn and to share.

By its first birthday, more than a million books had been issued and 1,290 young people aged between 11 and 16 had signed up to become a member of the library at The Hive.

By comparison, in the same period the year before at Worcester Library (July 2011 – January 2012), 100 young people joined the library service, so The Hive has increased membership 12-fold in this age category.

The innovative staffing model sees staff from the Council and the

University working closely together with shared values, and aims to provide a consistent level of service to all customers.

Strengths and skills in one team are shared with others, giving staff the chance to develop and progress, and the events programme draws on both internal staff and external partners to provide an exceptionally wide variety of events, far more than either the University or Council could provide themselves.

The Hive has an influence on library and heritage developments nationally and internationally, with staff constantly in demand as consultants and conference speakers.

THE BIRTH OF THE HIVE

THE LANDMARK BUILDING WAS ALMOST A DECADE IN PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT AND CAME AT A TIME OF INCREASING PUBLIC LIBRARY CLOSURES AROUND THE COUNTRY.

The Hive was borne out of a belief that the University's resources should be available to all. Long renowned for its high-quality teacher training, the University housed an impressive collection of children's books and classroom resources which, aside from the occasional staff member's child or school visit, lay out of reach of the very people they were intended to inspire – children.

Now those collections are at the very heart of The Hive's children's library, available for children to discover. The extensive classroom resources, filled with items to teach about other cultures, history and geography, can be borrowed by teachers, parent and toddler groups or individuals.

The University of Worcester and Worcestershire County Council were united by a desire to work more closely together and a belief that by doing so, services for both partners could be improved and exciting opportunities for learning and inclusion generated.

The aim was to improve the services that both partners could provide via a sustainable, state-of-the-art library facility, also housing a customer service centre, and historic archive and archaeology services within one building. All of these aims have been realised in practice.

The Hive now stands proud as an asset in the City, and has contributed significantly to the urban regeneration of the local community, transforming a brownfield city centre site that once housed the local dustcart depot.





Designed through collaboration between the University and County Council staff and the design team at architects Feilden Clegg Bradley Studios, The Hive is a respectful expression of the region's rich history with a distinctive roofline, augmented with seven irregular cones, that rises over the City, complementing the surrounding historic landscape, with its Cathedral and distant Malvern Hills.

Internally, the building was designed to include a mixture of public and private spaces with different functions. As well as communal browsing and reading areas, a café, and council customer services centre, there are meeting rooms and hundreds of private study spaces. Stock is integrated in a single sequence, not on separate floors, so public library books can occupy the same shelves as academic texts.

The inspirational Children's Library, one of the largest in the Country, includes unique storytelling spaces like the Story Pit and the enchanting Story Island, and is filled with a range of fun and interactive learning resources.

The library has drawn praise from many quarters, including former Children's Laureates Dame Jacqueline Wilson and Michael Rosen.

The Hive has won numerous awards for its design, concept and use over the past decade, including Best Sustainability in a Project at the Partnership Awards, Best Contribution to the Local Community by a University in The Guardian University Awards, Outstanding Library Team in the Times Higher Leadership and Management Awards and three awards from the Royal Institute of British Architects (RIBA), including its prestigious National Award.

There have been several awards for environmental sustainability and architectural excellence, for community benefit and for design and innovation from the Royal Institute of Chartered Surveyors.

CHILDREN AND SCHOOLS

THE HIVE IS REGULARLY FILLED WITH CHILDREN WHO COME TO READ WITH THEIR FAMILIES, TO BORROW BOOKS OR TO STUDY.

Almost 125,000 children and parents took part in free family events during The Hive's first decade, including weekly Bounce and Rhyme and Rata-tat story telling sessions.

The Hive has hosted more than 40,000 school children, as well as local Scouts, Brownies and other groups who regularly take part in activities.

The Children's Library, with its amalgamation of the University's school national curriculum resources, and books and imaginative literature from both the University and the public library, is one of the largest – and arguably most beautiful – children's libraries in the UK. It helps children and young people to achieve their potential, supporting learning through the provision of quiet space to study, access to learning resources and opportunities to engage in activities for all ages that encourage reading, improve literacy, develop STEM skills, promote successful study techniques and support wellbeing. The library also houses extensive resources available to the many hundreds of trainee teachers in the University's Institute of Education, as well as for local schools and teachers, community groups and individuals, who are looking for inspiration or props for engaging children in different activities.

EDUCATION AND RESEARCH

THE HIVE IS A HUB FOR LEARNING, A PLACE WHERE UNIVERSITY STUDENTS, SCHOOL AND COLLEGE PUPILS AND ADULT LEARNERS SIT SIDE BY SIDE AND ENGAGE IN EDUCATION AND RESEARCH. IT SUPPORTS AND SHOWCASES RESEARCH THAT BENEFITS SOCIETY AT LARGE.

The varied adult learning programme helps people to secure jobs or start formal learning having never been confident enough to do so before.

The University library, with its extensive collection of academic texts and books, is largely housed on the upper library floors, providing a wonderful study facility which all are welcome to use.

Since opening, 70,000 academic queries have been answered by university library staff and more than 4,500 school, college and university students have attended Study Happy events, designed to help them look after their mental and physical health while studying.

In addition to Study Happy, over the last 10 years more than 6,250 sixth form and college students from 40 schools and colleges have visited The Hive for research skills sessions, helping with the transition to university.

The Hive is unique in offering a university library enquiries service to all members of the community. This is now being extended out to library users across the county.

The Hive also acts as a venue for showcasing and engaging the community in the University's extensive research activity through exhibitions, displays, lectures and interactive discussion groups.

EMPLOYABILITY AND SKILLS

THE HIVE HELPS PEOPLE ACHIEVE THEIR POTENTIAL, SUPPORTING THEM INTO FURTHER EDUCATION AND EMPLOYMENT THROUGH THE PROVISION OF OPPORTUNITIES TO LEARN AND DEVELOP NEW SKILLS, VOLUNTEER, GAIN WORK EXPERIENCE AND ACCESS JOB-SEEKING SUPPORT.



More than 4,700 adults have been supported with community learning and developing vital job skills in The Hive's first decade.

There is a weekly Job Club to assist people in creating CVs and applying for jobs, and there are opportunities throughout the year for young people to gain work experience.

The Hive partners with Youth Hub (WCC Learning and Skills and the Department for Work and Pensions) to host two Job Fairs a year, which regularly have more than 250 people in attendance. They also host multiple training sessions for people between the ages of 15 and 24 looking for work in several different sectors including nursing, midwifery, paramedics, security services and construction.

Since running the Job Fairs, more than 50 people have received engagements into recruitment processes by local and national businesses, and many others have taken the opportunity for training in areas which will increase their employability.

HEALTH AND WELLBEING

THE HIVE PROMOTES HEALTH AND WELLBEING, SUPPORTING HEALTHIER AND HAPPIER LIVES THROUGH THE PROVISION OF A SAFE AND WELCOMING COMMUNITY SPACE FOR ALL, WITH RESOURCES TO SUPPORT SELF-HELP AND OPPORTUNITIES TO CONNECT WITH OTHERS AND GAIN SKILLS AND CONFIDENCE.

There are Italian, French, Spanish and Russian language cafés which help people to find like-minded individuals and brush up on their conversation skills; the Health Walk meets in the building every Wednesday morning, encouraging people to improve their fitness as well as helping them to feel less isolated.

The Hive also has a collection of Reading Well books, recommended by health experts or those with lived experience, which are designed to help people to understand and manage their mental health and wellbeing.

The Study Happy initiative repeats throughout the year, during assessment periods for university, school and college students, encouraging them to study in a mindful way, making sure they take regular breaks, promoting healthy eating and sleeping patterns as well as providing activities which help the students to rest in between studying.

DIGITAL INCLUSION

The Hive is helping to reduce the 'digital divide' by improving access and literacy, helping people to grow digital skills and confidence through free access to computers, the internet and Wi-Fi and providing support to use IT and access online services from Library Digital Champions and Access to IT learning courses. resources largely (though not exclusively) through wireless access.

In its first decade, more than 150,000 users have been supported to access PCs, while more than 700 people have benefited from a support session with The Hive's digital champions.

The statistics show that 70% of the use of the desktop computers in The Hive is by members of the public, while students use the digital

GETTING INVOLVED

The Hive boasts an army of generous volunteers who give up their time to help others, as Digital Champions helping to provide support to people with low digital skills, or as delivery drivers for the Library Service at Home customers who are unable to come to the library themselves.

There are also Event Volunteers providing much-needed support during busy event days, and Meet and Greet Volunteers making sure people receive a warm welcome as they come through the door. Since opening, more than 15,200 hours of time have been given by volunteers.

The Hive promotes greater prosperity, s u p p o r t i n g e n t e r p r i s e , entrepreneurship and business growth through services that include comprehensive business resources, advice on intellectual property, opportunities to learn from local business and signposting to other business enterprise services.

In 2021, a Business and Intellectual Property Centre (BIPC) was launched, providing free and accessible business advice, support,

information and resources. In its first three years, the Centre supported more than 100 start-up businesses a month with advice and resources.

The business support programme has seen more than 3,000 attendees since launching in 2021 and continues to work alongside other organisations, including Worcestershire Growth Hub, local networking groups and the University's Business School, to provide cohesive business support across the local business community.

THE HIVE HAS BEEN RECOGNISED AS OUTSTANDINGLY SUSTAINABLE IN ITS BUILDING DESIGN.



Through innovative parametric modelling, laminated timber was used instead of 250 tonnes of steel in the roof, saving 2,000 tonnes of CO² compared with a concrete or steel alternative, and a biomass boiler uses locally sourced wood chip to generate heat.

Around 43% of the water used within the building is harvested from rainwater. By incorporating sustainable measures such as these, and many others, The Hive achieved an 'A' rating for its Energy Performance Certificate, and in 2013 won the BREEAM Outstanding award, which sets the standard for best practice in sustainable design. It was also named as Building Awards Most Sustainable Project in 2013. A Sustainability Trail and regular tours showcase the building's credentials. ACHIEVEMENTS IN THE FIRST DECADE:
