

# New 30-credit short course developing the skills needed for good autism practice

This course will support you to develop your knowledge and understanding of the differences experienced by autistic children and young people, including those with co-occurring diagnoses and those with complex needs.

You will explore developments in knowledge and understanding of autism including critical debates around language, diagnosis, and theoretical positions.

You will be introduced to a range of strategies and approaches to support development of your practice in working with children and their families to ensure good autism practice and inclusion.

## Why study a short course?

- Learn new skills and gain professional knowledge needed to work with children in education, early years and children's services.
- Build your portfolio, meet and network with others in education, early years and children's services.
- Try out higher education without committing to a full degree.

#### How will I learn?

You will be taught over 12 weeks beginning with a full day in-person launch conference where you can meet the other students on your course on **27th January 2024.** 

This will be followed by weekly evening live-online teaching sessions on **Thursdays 6pm-8.15pm** in the virtual classroom and flexible online learning activities to fit around your work and commitments.

## What entry qualifications do I need?

Your application will be considered on evidence of relevant experience and prior learning. We welcome applications from experienced and mature learners who do not have formal GCSE/A Level qualifications.

### Is student finance available for short courses?

Tuition fee loans are available for this short course as part of the government's preparations for the Lifelong Learning Entitlement. You will be eligible for a loan if you live in England, even if you have had student loans for university courses in the past.
